PRINCIPAL'S LETTER

Dear Parents, Guardians, and the LHS Community,

It is great to be back. As I said on the night of Open House, Ledyard High School has gotten off to a remarkably positive start in many ways, despite Mother Nature sending Irene our way. The behavior and seriousness of purpose of our students have been truly excellent. Our sports teams are competing, yearbooks are being sold, our band is marching, and drama auditions have begun (under our new head and assistant drama coaches, Mr. Hammond and Mr. Lambert, respectively. Mr. Hammond was a drama teacher at Lyme-Old Lyme for 14 years and directed over 30 shows.) Our teachers have been buoyed by the continued improvement in our test scores and the very positive comments we heard from many of you at Open House. I hope that the experiences of your children so far mirror the general feeling as we enter the second month of school. While, of course, the faculty and I have much on our plates as we work to keep the school moving forward, I can tell you that it is a wonderful time to be the principal of Ledyard High.

A few points of emphasis:

The information available at our recent Open House included how to contact your child's teachers. Speaking or writing directly to our teachers is always the most efficient way to have your questions answered. Remember that all teachers use the Ledyard.net email; individual teachers may be reached by using the first initial followed by last name@ledyard.net. Mine, for example, is lgabordi@ledyard.net. Also, please feel free to use our voice mail system. The directory is available by calling us at 464-9600.

We invite you all to join us for our Parent Advisory Council (PAC) meetings on the first Monday of each month from 6:30 – 7:30 in the LHS library. Meetings will continue monthly through May. This is an important opportunity to learn more about the educational experience of your children and to influence our thinking, as well. You will help to determine the monthly agendas. Each year we seem to have a few more folks involved, and we hope you will join us whenever you can. Be sure to bring your questions and suggestions, if you have any, or just come to learn a little more about LHS.

We encourage all of you to frequently visit our student information system, Power School. The system has also saved a good deal of time and expense by allowing us not to send home progress reports, since that information is quite literally at your fingertips on line whenever you wish to see it. In addition, we send out report "cards" at the end of each semester only. That is, we will not print report cards after the first quarter in each semester. We will use our *School Messenger* service to remind you all when "progress report" time has arrived and when quarter grades have been posted, among other uses of this service. Of course, none of this applies to people for whom internet access is difficult. In you are in that category, please call Ledyard High School (860 464-9600) to let us know; we will be sure to mail hard copies directly to your home.

After a successful first year, Digital Portfolios are now being used in 9th, 10th and 11th grade classes in order to monitor, organize, and report our students' progress towards achievement of our school-wide academic expectations for student learning. Students in these grades are responsible for submitting two pieces of work (known as "artifacts") per credit that will be evaluated using school-wide rubrics (grading criteria). Requirements also include a reflective component. Besides measuring student achievement of our expectations, portfolios enable students to demonstrate growth over time as Ledyard High School moves towards meeting future state graduation requirements. As has been the case with Power School, parents and students, through the use of a password, are able to access their student folder. Again, accommodations will be made for those who cannot access the internet.

Again, many thanks for all you do. I look forward to another year as we collaborate for the benefit of your children.

CAREER CENTER NEWS

CAREER DAY

The Career Center is busy preparing for the annual **Career Day** to be held on **Thursday, November 17th**. Every student will fill out a survey as to what their career aspirations are after they leave Ledyard High School. Students are asked where they see themselves five years after graduation and indicate what Career Clusters interest them most.

Students are then assigned three speakers that are closely related to their interests. Each presentation lasts 25 minutes. Approximately 60-75 professionals are recruited to participate in our Career Day. Presenters provide such information as: how they came into their jobs; how high school academics relate; what higher education or training is required; what are the pros and cons of their professions; and what a typical day involves

This year the Freshmen Class will also hear a presentation from the Department of Labor. They will give them information about where they can legally get a job, working papers and the amount of hours they can work.

Department of Motor Vehicles and a Connecticut State Trooper will speak to the Sophomore Class about new driving laws and how to go about getting their learners permit and drivers license.

Junior Class members who indicate that they are planning to attend college will hear a presentation from an admissions officer from a state university. They will explain what they can be doing over the summer to get ready for the application process in the fall. Those students who indicate that they will not be going on to college will hear from several trade schools as well as apprenticeship programs.

A banking representative will speak to the seniors about the importance of their credit report, loans, checking accounts, credit cards and basic financial responsibilities.

ASVAB TEST

The Armed Services Vocational Aptitude Battery (ASVAB) test will be given on Tuesday, November 29, 2011 at the High School. This **free** Career Exploration Program is designed to be helpful to students, whether they plan to enter the workforce after graduation or pursue further education at a university, community college, or vocational institution. This test offers an interest inventory and other activities designed to help students explore the world of work and gain confidence in making career decisions.

It is important to understand that there is **no recruiter contact** from this listing of students and results **will not be released** to recruiting military services.

The ASVAB Test is open to students in the 11th and 12th grades. Students interested in taking the test can sign up in the Career Center starting Monday, November 7, 2011. Permission slips are required for students under the age of 18 and are due by Wednesday, November 23. Describe and analyze an act of political courage by a United States elected official that took place during or after 1956. Include an analysis of the obstacles, risks, and consequences associated with the act. The essay may concern an issue at the local, state, national, or international level.

LHS Music Receives "Horns for Kids" Grant

Horns For Kids, Inc. is a non-profit organization that supports deserving school music programs throughout Connecticut whose mission is to encourage children to experience the thrill of performing music in school and as a life-long activity. H4K raises funds through private and corporate contributions and awards clean, playable instruments to deserving school music programs throughout the state. They accept donations of new and gently used instruments, have them refurbished if necessary, and distribute them through grants. Since 2003, H4K has helped over 300 Connecticut schools.

In September, Ledyard High School Instrumental Music teacher Tom Green wrote a grant to H4K and received a Groove Percussion complete drum set from Horns for Kids to replace the well-worn set LHS music students had been using since the early 1990's. News from the University of Connecticut
Marine Science Class at Ledyard High School!



Students in the class went on their first field trip of the year in September! In conjunction with Project Oceanology, students investigated changes in dune topography at Bushy Point Beach (Groton). Particularly exciting were changes seen due to “Irene” which impacted the coastal areas in August.

Student groups used lots of great technology during their trip from surveyor transits to GPS units to laser rangefinders!

The follow-up in the classroom included a group research paper detailing their findings from this year’s data set and comparing the current data to that from last year.

Flu Facts

What is influenza?

Seasonal influenza, also called the flu, is a contagious viral infection of the nose, throat and lungs. Influenza is a serious illness that leads to approximately 20,000 hospitalizations and nearly 100 deaths in American children younger than 5 years of age each year. Anyone can get influenza, but infection rates are highest among children (~20-30% each year).

How is influenza spread?

Influenza is spread easily from person to person; when someone who has it sneezes, coughs or even talks, the virus passes into the air and can be breathed in by anyone close by. Sometimes people can become infected by touching something—such as a surface or object—with influenza virus on it and then touching their mouth or nose.

How can individuals prevent getting the influenza?

Annual vaccination is the best way to prevent the influenza. The vaccine is safe and effective, and is given to tens of millions of Americans each year. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends a three-pronged approach: influenza vaccination, use of antiviral medications for treatment or prevention, and use of other measures to decrease the spread of influenza, including hand hygiene, respiratory hygiene, cough etiquette, and staying home from work and school when ill.

Who should get vaccinated?

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) now recommends annual influenza vaccination for all people over the age of 6 months.

When should individuals get vaccinated?

Seasonal influenza usually circulates during the fall and winter each year in the United States. It’s impossible to tell exactly when activity will begin in a given area, so it is important to get immunized as soon as vaccine is available in

your community. Getting the influenza vaccine anytime throughout the season continues to be beneficial. The immunity from vaccination continues to be protective throughout the fall and winter.

How often do individuals need to be vaccinated?

The seasonal influenza vaccine is updated each year to protect against the viruses expected to circulate during the upcoming season. Individuals need to be vaccinated every year because the virus can change. Most people only need one vaccine dose, but children younger than 9 years of age need two doses at least one month apart the first year they are vaccinated.

Where can individuals get vaccinated?

Parents and caregivers should contact their pediatrician or other health care professional to request the influenza vaccine for their children, themselves and other household contacts. Local hospitals, health clinics, retail stores and even some employers also hold vaccination clinics.
